Fiber Arts Beadwork Competition

Time is running out to submit your entry(s) for the Beadwork (or other) competition at the 2024 Fiber Arts Fiesta. The work you enter must have been completed by you after March 1, 2022.

We encourage all BSNM members to consider entering the Fiber Arts Beadwork competition

The categories are shown in a graphic at the end of this article. There is prize money for first and second place in each category.

Call for Entries closes on Sunday, January 7, 2024 at midnight. To enter, you must submit a photo of your entry and the \$10 entry fee online.

The actual entries will be collected in the March 2024 timeframe to allow for judging before the Fiesta.

Application Requirements

- Entries must be completed after March 1, 2022.
- Entrants may enter not more than three (3) entries per division. (Beadwork is one division.)
- Entrants may enter multiple divisions, complying with each division's Rules for Submission.
- All entries will be juried for content. Divisions that are judged will have the judging requirements listed in the Divisions Rules for Submission.
- Entry fees for members of a participating guild (which the Bead Society is) - \$10 per entry.
- Entry fees for nonmembers of a participating guild
 \$15 per entry.
- Entrants, both members and non-members, must enter electronically (photos are electronically submitted and payment is through PayPal or by credit card). The entrant is allowed to upload a maximum of two photos per entry. One photo must show all completed edges of entry in a straight on shot and one photo may show a close up of the entry.
- Mailed entries will not be accepted.
- How to enter electronically: Use the CaFE application process to complete your entry. If you are entering more than one item, follow the instructions for multiple entries. Follow the stepby-step instructions provided in the How to Enter section below.

How to Enter

Make sure you have one or two photos of your entry before beginning the entry process.

(Suggestion: identify your photo(s) with your name and the name of your entry.)

Go to https://abqfiberartscouncil.org/fiber-arts-fiesta-2024/afaf-2024-call-for-entries/. On this page you will find General Instructions for entering and the divisions that you may enter, as well as a tip sheet for using CaFÉ (a third party through which Fiber Arts is processing the entries). Use the following instruction to set up a profile and enter your items in the Beadwork competition:

 Click on the link under the heading Call for Entries on CaFÉ.

- **2.** Click on the green Apply Now button. (You may need to scroll down a little to see it.) Be sure to read the Application Requirements.
- **3.** On the CaFÉ Login screen, click on Artist Sign Up on the black bar.
- **4.** On the Register for CaFÉ screen, read the Terms and Conditions and click on the green Yes, I Agree button.
- **5.** On the Contact Information screen, fill in your information, including creating a username and password.
- **6.** Under Artistic Discipline section, click on the plus sign. Check the Fiber/Textile Art box.
- **7.** Confirm you are not a robot. Then click on the orange Create My Profile button.
- **8.** On the confirmation screen (after your profile is set up), click on the orange Continue to Login button.
- **9.** On the CaFÉ Login screen, fill in your username and password (that you just created). Confirm that you are not a robot. Click on the green Log In button.
- **10.** On the My CaFÉ Entries screen, are the three steps that must be completed: My Portfolio, Apply to Calls, and Checkout. Click on the My Portfolio link.
- **11.** On the My Portfolio screen, review the information provided and click on the orange Add Media button.
- **12.** On the Add Media screen, Image is automatically selected (green area). Click on the Choose File button to upload the image(s) of your beadwork.
- **13.** Fill in the requested information on this screen. In the Material section, suggest using "beaded necklace" or similar wording. There is a box for a more detailed description at the bottom of the page. In the Primary Discipline section, use the dropdown menu to select Jewelry. When you have filled in the required information, click on the orange Add to My Profile button.
- 14. On the CaFÉ Preview screen, review your information. Click on the blue Visit the My CaFÉ Entries page link.
- **15.** You will be returned to the My CaFÉ Entries screen. Click on the Apply to Calls link.
- 16. On the Apply to Calls screen, type Fiber Arts Fiesta in the Call Listings search bar. Press Enter (or click on the magnifying glass) to search. When the information about Fiber Arts Fiesta appears, click on the green Apply Now button.
- **17.** On the Agreement screen, review the information and click on the light green Agree button.
- **18.** On the Fiber Arts Fiesta 2024 Call for Entry screen, fill in the requested information. "Beads" is preselected. If your entry is not in the Beadwork competition, select the appropriate category. In the Participating Guild Affiliation box, select Bead Society of New Mexico from the dropdown menu.

In the Division Entry box, select Beads from the dropdown menu.

In the Entry Category (Judged) box, select the

- appropriate category from the dropdown menu that best fits your beadwork.
- **19.** If you are submitting more than one piece, select the Additional Entries box and follow the instructions. If you are only submitting one piece, select the No Additions Entries box.
- 20. You can click on the white Save button to save your information (there is a 30-minute time limit on the page). However, if you have not completed all the steps on this page, you will be prompted to do so.
- **21.** Select the box(s) for the image(s) of your entry. Click the on green Save Application button.
- **22.** A confirmation screen will appear. You may preview or go back to your entry to make corrections prior to checkout. If everything is correct, click on **the green I'm** ready to checkout button.
- 23. On the CaFÉ Checkout screen, select the \$10 Member Fee box. Your total fee will show. Click on the green and white Proceed to Checkout button.

- **24.** On the next screen, review the information and choose to pay by card or PayPal and provide the requested information. When you are finished, click on the green Submit Payment button.
- **25.** A confirmation page will appear. Print out this page for your records. After printing your entry confirmation, click on the orange Log Out button to exit the Call for Entries portion of the CaFÉ website.

The Albuquerque Fiber Arts Fiesta will be held Friday-Saturday, April 12-13, 2024 from 10:00am to 5:00pm each day in the Manuel Lujan Building at the New Mexico State Fairgrounds (Expo NM). The exhibition is divided into fiber-related divisions of knitting, mixed media, beads, crochet, embroidery, knitting by machine, lacemaking, quilting, sewing, and weaving/spinning. Fiber Arts Fiesta is an in-person live exhibit where all the entries will be displayed for public viewing.

B101: All bead embroidery entries.

B102: Woven bead entries made both off and on loom, including kumihimo

B103: Beaded entries featuring beads MADE by the artist (minimum 50% components)

B104: Beaded entries featuring beads NOT made by the artist.

B105: Beaded non-jewelry (home décor and clothing) items (beads must comprise 50% of the Item)

B106: Metal jewelry items including chain mail and wire work (wire/metal must comprise 50% of the item

B107: Not Judged: Beadwork by youth 12 years or under as of January 15, 2022

B108: Not Judged: Beadwork by youth 13- 18 years of age.

RULES FOR SUBMISSION OF

BEADWORK

- Work must have been completed by entrant after March 1, 2022.
- Please label each piece with your name, address and the title of the piece.
- All entries must be finished and ready to display.
- 4. The jury in each division and/or the Exhibition Committee reserves the right to reclassify an entry into another division and/or category when deemed appropriate based upon the description and photo(s) submitted on the Fiesta Entry Form.
- Entries may not be removed from display until Fiesta closes. Professional Security is provided during Fiesta offhours/overnight.

Some of the organizations that BSNM members (either individually or as a group) have contributed to over the years include:

- Beads of Courage (helps children with serious illness record, tell, and own their stories of survival through the use of colorful beads that honor their courage and acknowledge each step of their treatment journey)
- **Brews and Props** (decorated wooden airplane propellers are auctioned to provide funds for free transportation to people in need for non-emergency medical treatment)

- Pursonalities Plus (donates purses/backpacks containing scarves/gloves, toiletries, and jewelry to 25 Albuquerque-area women's programs programs for those out of domestic violence, sex trade, homelessness, incarceration, sexual assault, etc.)



A Circle of Beads

According to *An Illustrated Encyclopedia of Traditional Symbols* by J. C. Cooper, a circle of beads represents continuity, perpetuity, and endless duration. So what does a gathering of bead lovers and collectors represent? A continuing love of beads; an interest in learning how beads have endured as a source of currency and ornamentation; and a desire to perpetuate this fascination by sharing it with others in the community.

Working together, we can make the Bead Society of New Mexico all these things in the coming year.





Gem of the Month - Rhodolite

Rhodolite is an attractive red-violet (or raspberry) to pink-red garnet. The name rhodolite comes from the Greek words *rhodon* meaning "rose colored" and *lithos* meaning "stone."

Rhodolite is usually an intermediary variety between the pyrope and almandine series of garnets, usually containing more magnesium than iron in its chemical structure, thus leaning closer towards pyrope (it is often regarded as a variety of pyrope). Rhodolite tends to be lighter in color than most other kinds of red garnets. It can be easily confused with rubies because of the similarity in color. The name rhodolite is not a scientific term, and this form of garnet is not recognized as an individual mineral species. Despite this, the term is used and accepted in the gemstone industry.

Garnets of all varieties are hard (7 to 7.5 on the Mohs scale), but can be adversely affected by high heat. Temperature changes may cause garnets to fracture.

Similar to how certain sapphire variants are compared to cornflowers, rhodolite garnets are compared to raspberries, where the color is found in a spectrum of similar hues. In fact, one of the alternative names for rhodolite is raspberry garnet. Certain rhodolite stones are darker in the red to the purplish range and tend to be more valuable depending on factors other than color.

Rhodolites from different occurrences around the world have been characterized by crystal chemical and absorption spectral analysis showing that, besides iron, such elements as manganese, chromium, and vanadium may affect the color of rhodolites.

Rhodolite garnets appear as transparent red-pink-purplish gemstones, including all the different color shades between violet and red. The colors from different rhodolite sources may vary from a lavender pink to raspberry rose or raspberry red and from purplish-violet (grape) to purplish red.

Christians believed garnet symbolized Christ's sacrifice, while Islamics believed it illuminated the fourth heaven. During the Middle Ages, garnet was regarded as a gem of faith, truth, and constancy. The Celts and early medieval jewelers made extensive use of garnets in rings, brooches, buckles, and necklaces. These stones were considered to be very protective.

Asiatic tribes once fashioned bullets out of garnets, instead of lead, as they believed the garnet bullets were more deadly. As late as 1892, the Hanzas used garnet bullets against British troops.

Like other red or reddish stones (such as ruby, spinel, carnelian, and bloodstone), garnet was once thought to be a remedy for hemorrhages and blood disorders, as well as for all inflammatory diseases. Advocates of New Age philosophy and crystal therapy still believe garnet purifies the blood, improves circulation, and vitalizes bodily functions. Garnet is also believed to enhance the imagination and creativity, and to prevent fears of insecurity.

In a healing context, garnets balance the mind, the emotions, and the body, bringing the heart into alignment with a higher expression of love. They help you discard old ways of thinking and old patterns that no longer serve. Garnets open the way to abundance and vitality.

Garnet is not only the birthstone for January; it is also a gemstone for the zodiac signs of Capricorn and Aquarius.

Many deposits of economic importance are found in countries (such as Kenya, Madagascar, Malawi, Mozambique, and Tanzania) that belong to the **geological unit of the so called "Mozambique belt"** Other sources of rhodolites are in Brazil, India (Odisha), Norway, Sri Lanka, and the United States. Small garnets can be found in association with staurolite ("fairy cross") crystals near Taos, New Mexico.

The second annual Museum of Beadwork Challenge is open to submissions!

This challenge is once again being co-sponsored by Miyuki Co., Ltd., and Caravan Beads, and the Museum of Beadwork (MOB) is very grateful for their support. In addition to prizes, selected entries will be part of an exhibition in 2024.

Challenge Details

The MOB Challenge will have 5 categories:

Sculpture - Free standing 3-dimensional pieces.

Tapestry - Hanging/wall pieces, or framed work, generally 2-dimensional.

Clothing - Embroidered or constructed garments.

Accessories - Purses, shoes, masks, etc.

Jewelry - Body adornment other than clothing or accessory items.

Requirements:

All entries must evoke the challenge theme for this year: A Novel Tea: A Spot of Beads and Whimsy

This year's theme is tea parties; from realistic representations to the delightfully unconventional, inspired by literature, film, fantasy, or any other tea party-infused ideas you can envision. The Museum of Beadwork's staff are avid readers and hobby historians, and honestly, who doesn't love a tea party? So come have a spot, brew up an idea, and pour out your imagination (with one lump or two)!

- One entry per person. Entries must be made by a single person; no group entries allowed.
- All entries must be of original design: winning designs from any other contests may not be submitted.
- Any beading technique or combination of techniques may be used.
- All entries must be comprised primarily of Miyuki beads (70% or higher). This does not include things like armature, support, substrate, etc. Any Miyuki beads are acceptable, not just Delica beads. If you are unsure about the beads you have, contact your supplier for help.
- This is an international competition; entries from all countries are encouraged.
- There is no size limitation for this competition.
 Just remember that if your entry is chosen you will
 be expected to cover the shipping to and from
 Portland, Maine.
- The initial judging is based on digital images. Each entry can submit up to 10 images. Do not mail your actual beadwork to us until instructed to do so.
- The selected entrants from the initial round will be required to send in or deliver their completed pieces in order to be considered for the final judging.
- If your entry requires special display fixtures you are expected to send those as well, along with clear and simple instructions for display. If you have questions about special display needs, please contact us directly. (This does not include typical neck forms or mannequins. Feel free to inquire with questions before shipping).
- Selected entries will be on exhibit for a 1-year show in the Museum of Beadwork gallery.
- All applications, entrance fees, and photos must be received no later than midnight on March 15th, 2024. Entry fee is \$30, payable through the MOB website. Late submissions will not be considered.

- If you are selected for the final round you will also receive email notification with details on how to proceed.

Exhibit Details:

- Do not mail beadwork until instructed to do so.
- Only entries that make it to the second round of judging will be exhibited.
- Exhibition dates will be from June 1st, 2024 to May 31st, 2025.
- Artists will be responsible for all shipping to and from the Museum of Beadwork.
- Voting for the People's Choice category will take
 place from the opening of the exhibit until
 June 29th, 2024. Your piece must physically be on
 display to qualify.

New Year's Eve Organizers Unveil First Look at Times Square Ball before Celebrations

TIMES SQUARE, Manhattan (WABC) -- The Times Square New Year's Eve ball just got bigger and brighter with a bowtie to match.



Measuring 12 feet in diameter with over 2,600 Waterford crystal panels, the glittering display also comes with a bowtie pattern, designed in partnership with Fontainebleau Las Vegas, that harkens back to when Times Square used to be known as "The Bowtie."

New Year's Eve organizers unveiled the dazzling design Wednesday atop One Times Square ahead of the big celebration.

"That bowtie pattern will light up above the 2024, it's going to go all the way to that top, it's going to go all the way back down and it's going to rest at its year-round perch, where you can come any day of the week to Times Square and see that ball," said Jeffrey Straus, president of Countdown Entertainment.

This New Year's Eve will also mark the first time that the ball will be re-lit, featuring the new bowtie lighting pattern, after the traditional rendition of the Big Apple classic "New York, New York."

Ball Fun Facts

- The Ball is a geodesic sphere, 12 feet in diameter, and weighs 11,875 pounds.
- The Ball is covered with a total of 2,688 crystal triangles that vary in size, and range in length from 4% inches to 5% inches per side.
- The Ball is illuminated by 32,256 LEDs (light emitting diodes). Each LED module contains 48 LEDs — 12 red, 12 blue, 12 green, and 12 white for a total of 8,064 of each color.
- The Ball is capable of displaying a palette of more than 16 million vibrant colors and billions of patterns that creates a spectacular kaleidoscope effect atop One Times Square.
