June Meeting Recap

At our June general meeting we were pleased to have Jacob Lowry, Executive Director of the Turquoise Museum, as our speaker. Jacob relayed his extensive knowledge of turquoise with a big helping of humor.

Here are a few interesting facts from the meeting:

- **Most turquoise is "white"** (actually an extremely pale blue) known as chalk – about 85% of all turquoise
- The darker the color of the stone, the higher the grade of turquoise
- Spiderweb matrix in turquoise is the most valuable
- "Natural" turquoise is a gemstone
- "Real," "genuine," and "100%" turquoise are dictionary definitions (it's "real" because you can touch it!)
- "Imitation" is made to look like something (for example, vintage Czech glass that is made to look like turquoise)
- "Fake" is being misrepresented as something (for example, blue-dyed magnesite being sold as "turquoise")
- "White Buffalo turquoise" is actually magnesite
- There is lots of Sleeping Beauty turquoise (from Arizona) still in warehouses
- There is only about 100 pounds of Lander Blue turquoise (from Nevada) that was mined in 1974 – **that's all there is**
- **Despite the myth that Tiffany's got turquoise from the Cerrillos mine in New Mexico, they actually got their turquoise from Persia**



Jacob brought a display of turquoise (rough, polished cabs, beads, and finished jewelry) and books about turquoise, including the book written by his dad, Joe Dan Lowry.

Craft in America Video

The PBS documentary series *Craft in America* recently ran an **episode about jewelry** (episode originally aired November 4, 2021). "Jewelry" explores the history, artistry, and impact of personal adornment. Featured in the video are classic jeweler Tom Herman; Harriete Estel Berman who creates jewelry with recycled materials; the coeditors of *Ornament Magazine*; the legacy of modernist jeweler Art Smith; nature-inspired artist Gabrielle Gould; and Navajo/Hopi master jeweler Jesse Monongya.

Time Management

There are never enough hours in a day to accomplish everything we would like creatively. You have probably heard this before, but it's always good to be reminded of these tips to better your time management so you can feel more successful at being creative.


The first tip is to know your deadlines and set reminders. If you have a project that you know is due in a month, you can plan your time accordingly. In 2 weeks you might want to give yourself a reminder that you should be halfway to the finish. Create a daily planner to help keep you on track with daily progress. Give each part of your creativity a time limit. Let's face it: if we give ourselves 3 hours to do something we usually take the 3 hours or more. Be realistic, but push yourself not to waste time. Block out distractions. If you are continually interrupted by the phone or other family members: if possible, turn the phone off and close the door. As you establish this as a routine, other family members will come to respect your creative time and hopefully not interrupt as often.

I hope this month you feel a sense of joy in managing your creative time and accomplishments.



Gem Book

Turquoise: The World Story of a Fascinating Gemstone, Updated Edition

by Joe Dan Lowry and Joe P. Lowry



Updated edition includes 85 new photographs, including close-ups of cabochons from the famous mines that produce the best colors and matrix; information about mining activity and locations brings the story of world turquoise up to date.

Turquoise has been mined on six continents and traded by cultures throughout the world's history, including the European, Chinese, Mayan, Aztec, Inca, and Southwest Native American. It has been set in silver and gold jewelry, cut and shaped into fetish animals, and even formed to represent gods in many religions. This gemstone is displayed in museums around the world, representing the arts and traditions of prehistoric, historic, and modern societies. *Turquoise* focuses on the latest information in science and art from the greatest turquoise collections around the globe.

Joe Dan Lowry is world-renowned for his knowledge about turquoise and is sought after for appraisals, interviews, and lectures. He owns turquoise mines, is a skilled lapidary, and is co-author of the book *Turquoise Unearthed*. He developed and is curator of the Turquoise Museum in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he lives.

Joe P. Lowry has been the president of Zach-Low since 1972 and is the founder and president of the Turquoise Museum since 1993. He has been involved in bringing education to the turquoise and Indian jewelry industry at museums and national parks around the country. He co-authored *Turquoise Unearthed* with his son, Joe Dan Lowry.

The updated edition of this 10.8-inch by 1.3-inch by 12.2-inch hardback book was published by Gibbs Smith in August 2018. It has 256 pages – and weighs over 4 pounds! The list price is \$75.00 (\$56.35 on Amazon).


Created from a wooden shoe last (a hardwood maple form that leather shoes were made on through the 1970s; today, plastic forms are more commonly used). In addition, a radio dial plate; beaded purse frame; oil lamp parts; antique found objects including clock parts, music box parts, button hook, and buttons; and **bead embroidery** are incorporated into the piece.

Gem of the Month – Carnelian


"**Carnelian**" is now the most common term for this stone; however, this name is a 16th-century corruption of the 14th-century word "**cornelian**" (and its associated orthographies **corneline** and **cornalyn**). Carnelian (cognate with similar words in several Romance languages) comes from the Mediaeval Latin **corneolus**, itself derived from the Latin word **cornum**, the cornel cherry, whose translucent red fruits resemble the stone.

Carnelian is one of the most commonly available microcrystalline quartzes (it is a variety of chalcedony). It is made up of silicone dioxide colored by different levels of iron oxide impurities, with specks, banding, and stripes in many shades of brownish red and orange-red. The color, **sometimes called "flesh-colored,"** can vary greatly, ranging from pale orange to an intense almost-black coloration. **The stone's color** is best appreciated when polished.

Because of the uniformity of its texture, carnelian is often carved into numerous decorative and useful objects. Carnelians are usually heat-treated (and sometimes dyed) to improve their color.

Since ancient times, carnelian has been polished and worn as jewelry. The red variety of chalcedony has been known to be used as beads since the Early Neolithic in Bulgaria. The first faceted (with constant $16+16=32$ facets on each side of the bead) carnelian beads are described from the Varna Chalcolithic necropolis (middle of the 5th millennium BC). The bow drill was used to drill holes into carnelian in Mehrgarh in the 4th-5th millennium BC. Carnelian has been recovered from Bronze Age Minoan layers at Knossos

on Crete in a form that demonstrated its use in decorative arts; this use dates to approximately 1800 BC.

The Egyptians used it to contrast with onyx and lapis lazuli in the making of collars and necklaces. The Romans were fond of it set in gold, using small beads in earrings or larger polished stones in finger rings for men and women. Because carnelian is a hard stone, it can be carved: examples of Roman signet rings or cameo rings with exquisitely fashioned personal emblems or figures of the gods survive from the early second century CE. In the Middle Ages, carnelian was also popular as a healing stone. It was said to dissolve anger or rage, protect the wearer from negative influences, and promote courage.



Carnelian that was cut and faceted into beads in Idar-Oberstein, Germany, was used in the African bead trade.

Amulets of carnelian are also said to suppress loss of blood from wounds or excessive menstrual flow. Ancient warriors wore carnelian around their neck for courage and physical power to conquer their enemies. The German philosopher Goethe attributed the powers of protection against evil, of continuation of hope and comfort, and of good luck to carnelian. The Egyptians believed that being buried with a special carnelian amulet would invoke the goddess Isis to protect them from harm in the afterlife. As the first stone in the breastplate of the Jewish High Priest, carnelian signified the blood of the martyrs, and it was once believed to prevent illness and the plague.

Metaphysically, carnelian is said to speed up healing processes, especially after trauma or injury. It helps **increase one's vitality and strength; purifies the blood** and improves circulation; and is soothing to the emotions. Carnelian is believed to help timid speakers become both eloquent and bold.

Carnelian is a birthstone for July – wearing a birthstone is considered to bring you good fortune. It is also one of the zodiac stones for Virgo (Aug. 23 to Sept. 22).

Carnelian is found in many places around the world, which makes it very affordable. Most of carnelian on the market comes from India, Brazil, Britain, Iceland, Peru, Uruguay, and the United States (New Jersey and Oregon).

BSNM 2023 Elections

Although it is only July, the October elections are practically around the corner. All positions on the 2023 Board are open for anyone who wants to run. It would be wonderful if people would shadow the current officers and learn on the go before taking over.

For the current version of the bylaws, which contains the complete duties of the officers, go to www.beadsocietynm.org and log in to the website (you may need to register first if you haven't done so before). Click on the Members Only section in the upper right corner and then click on the Bylaws box on the left side of the page that opens (you may need to temporarily disable your pop-up blocker since the PDF opens in a new window or tab). In the bylaws you can read about every position on the Board and decide which one best suits your abilities and your time. The following is a brief description of the duties of the Board positions:

President (currently Barbara Rosen) – Preside at all general and Board meetings; oversee committees; sign contracts with the Treasurer; provide a president's column for the newsletter

1st Vice President-Classes and Special Events – Coordinate instructors and students for bead society-sponsored workshops; create brochures and flyers for workshops, when required; assist with special events in which BSNM participates

2nd Vice President-Programs (currently Pat Verrelle) – Plan and arrange programs for the general meetings and for each Bead Time session

Treasurer (currently Liz Reisinger) – Be custodian of all BSNM funds; keep an itemized account of all receipts and disbursements; submit a budget for Board discussion and approval; make payments in accordance with the budget upon receipt of receipts and completed reimbursement forms; prepare monthly financial reports; file taxes and renew business license

Secretary (currently Helen Yackel) – Record the proceedings of the Board meetings and the October general election meeting; send minutes to Board members in a timely fashion; conduct general correspondence of BSNM regarding business-related items

Membership Chair (currently Deb Cole) – Collect dues and distribute membership cards; collect monies for raffle tickets at general meetings; process online renewals for members and new members; maintain accuracy of Gmail and BSNM website databases of members

Membership Recruiter – Oversee and form a Welcome Committee; visit bead stores, shows, and events for the purpose of recruiting new members

Newsletter Editor (currently Jill Bartel) – Solicit, edit, and write articles for the Newsletter; maintain business member ads for publication; publish newsletter via email to all members

Volunteer Coordinator – Coordinate volunteer recruitment and scheduling for events where BSNM has a table/booth or where the BSNM's assistance has been requested; ensure membership applications and business cards are available for these events

Member-at-Large – Be responsible for representing the suggestions and concerns of the general membership to the Board

Webmaster (currently Amanda Archuleta) – Manage the content posted on the BSNM website; maintain the technical contracts for website, including eCommerce, webhosting, and event coordination applications

Social Media Manager – Maintain the BSNM Facebook page and other social networking accounts; add BSNM events to Facebook page; monitor Facebook activity for messages, likes, and unauthorized links to commercial pages

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

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

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
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Procedure for Submitting Articles for Publication
